February Message

Hello friends

I am writing this in the middle of January – known to be the most depressing week of the year as the bling of the Christmas season has faded away and the monthly pay packet is still just out of reach. By the time you are reading this, there may be some more hopeful signs of Spring arriving and you may feel lifted by Valentine's Day approaching – or you may not. The state of the world is pretty depressing too with our news reports full of wars and increasing conflicts, troubling political decisions and the ongoing degradation of the planet. It seems to me that it's more important than ever to keep hope close to our hearts. We can think about 'hope' as just 'wishful thinking', but the verb for 'hope' used in the bible translates as 'to trust and wait expectantly'.

When we think about difficult situations and people who are lost, we shake our heads and refer to them sadly as 'a hopeless case'. And I often feel

a bit naïve when I express hope at these times. But someone who believes this world is as good as it gets will live differently from the person who believes he or she has a future full of abundance and joy. Hope has a way of getting us through whatever we are facing, although believing that change can happen does require a persistent amount of not giving up. And here is where my faith comes in. It is this faith that keeps me at it when my tiny efforts seem ineffective or when I am overwhelmed by the enormous pain that the world carries.

There is a metaphor in the story of Noah which comes to mind especially as flooding is becoming a regular event in our country! Noah had spent a long time couped up with all his animals drifting on the sea and eventually sent out a dove to see if the waters had subsided and there was any land. But the dove returned having found nowhere to build its nest. So Noah waited in hope. After some time he sent the dove again, but still



there was no sign of land. Noah waited in hope. He sent the dove out for a third time and this time it returned with a sign of hope - an olive leaf in its beak. Noah continued to wait in hope. He sent the dove out again and this time it didn't return as it had found somewhere to build its nest. When we are navigating the seas of uncertainty and the world around us looks bleak, Noah reminds us that to live hopefully is not naïve but is both healthy for us and for our world.

STALISFIELD VILLAGE HALL - Message from the Trustees

In July 2022 the trustees responded to some residents' concerns about noise and disturbance in the summer months from what was considered a high number of wedding and party bookings. It was agreed that Stalisfield Village Hall Trustees would restrict further bookings for the remainder of 2022 and 2023 and trial one large event booking per month in 2024; this to continue if the income from hires and fundraising covered costs. Unfortunately due to a significant decline in bookings, combined with the current rise in expenditure on utilities and maintenance, it has become clear that this policy will not cover the day to day running and upkeep costs of the hall going forward.

We have therefore taken the decision to allow two event bookings per calendar month in 2025 onwards. This will ensure that we can continue to run community events and keep the hall open for villagers. We hope that the village understands that this is not a decision that has been made lightly and should anybody wish to go through the budget/costings etc we are happy to do so – please contact Tracy on 0771 736 7936.

DAVID LELAND - renowned theatre, film & television writer and actor

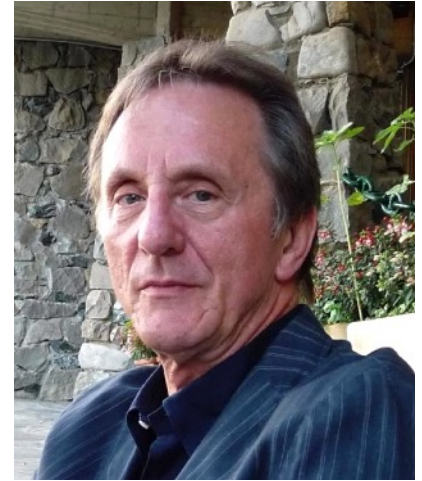
Following a long, painful illness, good friend and neighbour David Leland passed away on Christmas Eve at home in Otterden, his beloved wife Sabrina by his side, caring for him to the end.

David's life and distinguished career has been written about extensively these last few weeks, with Obituaries in the Press or social media. Sabrina has received many personal messages from those he worked and collaborated with - Michael Palin, Liam Neeson, Olivia Harrison, Charles Dance; those whose careers he helped launch including Pierce Brosnan, Tim Roth, Cathy Tyson, Emily Lloyd. "Grittiness and compassion" were hallmarks of his work

After training at the Central School of Speech and Drama London and following numerous television plays and mini-series David moved to Sheffield as resident director at the Crucible Theatre for 3 years. Here he commissioned two of the

"Pythons" Terry Jones and Michael Palin to write the series of short plays "Their Finest Hours"; also Victoria Wood's first play, "Talent" on the strength of its plot which she scribbled on an envelope posting it through his letterbox.

Back in London he directed at the Roundhouse and Royal Court Theatres. Music related work included creating/directing videos for The Travelling Wilburys in the US, working with good friend George Harrison, Bob Dylan, Roy Orbison, Tom Petty and Jeff Lynne. In 2003 he filmed and directed "Concert for George" at the Albert Hall for which he won a Grammy and was recently shown on TV. His tv productions and films include The Big Man, Land Girls, Personal Services, Wish You Were Here (BAFTA), Mona Lisa, The Borgias. It is difficult to condense his output in a short article, among many outstanding productions was the "Bastogne" episode of Spielberg/Hanks'



acclaimed series Band of Brothers winning him an EMMY. Although frail he was still creating and writing until last Summer.

David and Sabrina have been part of Otterden and wider community life since 2011; he was a lovely man with quiet, easy humour; together with Sabrina's warm and delicious hospitality they were a great team, valued neighbours and friends.

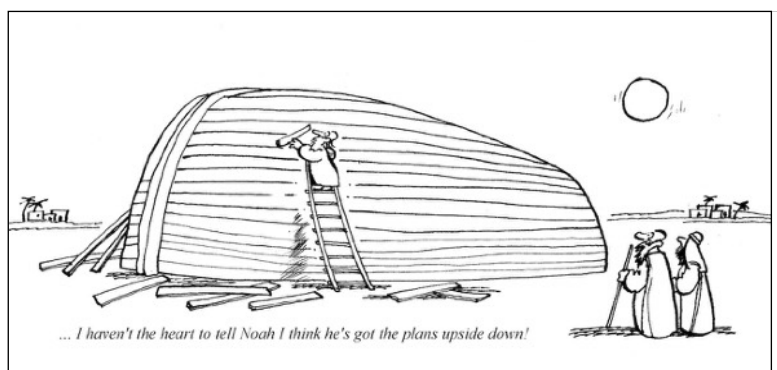

What is the point of temptation?

'Happy is the man who doesn't give in and do wrong when he is tempted, for afterwards he will get ... his reward....' James 1:12

Temptation becomes a stepping stone rather than a stumbling block, when you realise that it's *just as much an opportunity to do the right thing, as the wrong thing*. Temptation just gives you the choice!

It's helpful to remember that God develops the fruit of the Spirit in us by allowing circumstances in which we're tempted – to express the exact opposite quality! For instance, He teaches us to love by bringing unlovely people into our lives. It takes no character to love people who are lovely and loving you. God teaches us joy in the midst of sorrow by causing us to turn to Him for comfort and strength, when all our other supports are gone.

He develops peace within us, not by making things go the way we planned, but by allowing times of chaos and confusion. Peace comes when we choose to trust God in situations where we're tempted to worry or be afraid.

Likewise, patience is developed through circumstances in which we're forced to wait and are tempted to be angry or have a short fuse.

You can't claim to be good, if you've never been tempted to be bad; or be faithful if you've never had the opportunity to be unfaithful. Integrity is built through defeating dishonesty; humility grows as you refuse to give place to pride; endurance develops as you reject the temptation to give up. The truth is that each time you defeat a temptation, you become more like Jesus.

This month both Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day fall on the same day! The link between the two can be summed up in terms of the nature of real love! Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, focuses on learning to love God more, as we give Him space in our lives. This is what Jesus found when He was led into the desert by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan. (Luke 4:1-13).

Jesus was tempted to turn stones into bread. Yet loving God and His word comes before satisfying physical desires.

the Cross. We see this clearly demonstrated in the life and death of Saint Valentine.

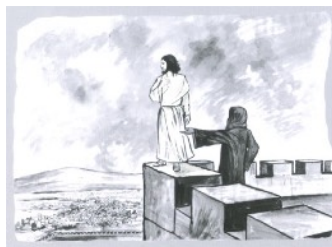

News from Rich Lehmann, Swale and Kent County Councillor

In late November I had the chance to visit a place I'd been wanting to see for years. Nothing as exciting as the Taj Mahal or the Sydney Opera House though, this was a visit to the Material Recycling Facility in Crayford where all of our dry recycling is sorted to be sent on for recycling and re-use.

Way back in 2017 when I was involved with the Plastic Free Faversham campaign group, I visited the incinerator at Allington where our rubbish is burned to generate electricity, and on another occasion we visited the site where our food and garden waste is turned into compost. I never managed to make it to the place which arguably held the answer to the most frequently asked questions around our household waste.

Questions like 'how clean does food packaging need to be before it's put in the recycling?' (quite clean, but it doesn't need to be spotless), 'can black plastic actually be recycled now?' (sometimes), and 'can I put tetrapak cartons in the recycling?' (sadly, not at the current time, but soon!).

The visit was prompted in part by the fact that Swale Borough Council is about to start a new contract for household waste collection. From late March, our bins will all be collected by Suez instead of Biffa, and our collection days *may* change – a letter will be going out to all households in the coming weeks to confirm whether your collection day will be the same or not, and I will aim to provide this information in the piece I write next month if I can.

The new contract gives us a chance to try and redouble our efforts to improve the rates of dry recycling we collect across Swale which, over the last few years, have remained fairly flat and well below where they could potentially be.

There are two issues which cause our recycling rates to be lower than they could. The first is the more obvious one, that people are putting perfectly recyclable items in their household waste. The second, less obvious but more harmful one, is that residents are putting non-recyclable items into their blue recycling bins. This is far more problematic as it can cause entire

lorry loads full of recyclable waste to be rejected when they reach the transfer station in Sittingbourne, which means (literally) tons of paper, plastic and glass is sent for incineration rather than recycling.

On the same day as the visit to Crayford, we visited the transfer station at Sittingbourne and saw two lorry loads of recycling unloaded. Unfortunately both loads were rejected as the levels of contamination within them were too high. Most of the items responsible for the loads being rejected were clearly not appropriate to go into the recycling.

There were used disposable nappies, an old pillow, and a large amount of the material was shiny and stuck together with something that may have been used cooking oil.

A large part of our work in the coming years will be trying to get the message out about the harm putting non-recyclable items in your blue bin, and our comms team have already put together a video with footage filmed at the transfer station - <http://tinyurl.com/sbc1223>

Officers within the council often use the term 'dry recycling' when referring to the materials that are suitable to go into blue bins, and I think if we could use this term publicly more often it may help to shift perceptions a little and start to reduce this problem.

The scammers are having a field day at the moment with their special offers, especially on Facebook, so unless on a secure website that you would normally use a excellent deal is usually a scam.

Again, with the adverse weather the potholes are getting worse so please be very aware.

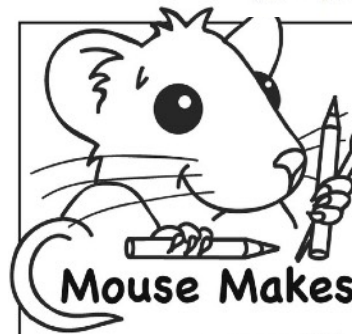

ASH WEDNESDAY

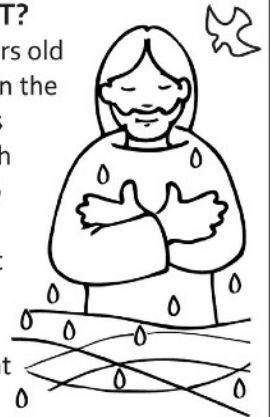
